Course Description

This course will provide the student with a general introduction to English linguistics, including the areas of Syntax, Morphology, Semantics, Phonetics, and Phonology. The goal of this course is to enable you to understand better how we acquire and use language, as well as how to characterize what we know about language. The course is presented as a first course in linguistics and requires no previous knowledge.
